



Invisible No More", a book that has been embraced by the aging in place movement in America. The book details the challenges involved in Dr. Teel's 30-year career of providing care to the older people in his home community in Maine while keeping them at home where they want to be. Moreover, the book calls for a paradigm shift in the care of our elders in America.

A recent survey by AARP suggests that 90% of adults want to remain in their own homes. The question then is, why do so many wind up in long-term care facilities such as assisted living and nursing homes? Dr. Teel's solution was to create Full Circle America, a for-profit telemedicine support program that combines digital tools,to keep tabs on the older person's health with a network of family, volunteers and paid caregivers to help with other needs. Dr. Teel says that through his Full Circle America approach, he can reduce the daily hours of care someone needs from 24 to only two, with the other 22 hours of monitoring being provided via webcam and volunteers. Teel's approach can dramatically cut the cost of care for an older person, especially when compared with the cost of an assisted living facility or nursing home. Registration brochure.

DID YOU KNOW?

- * Today there are seven potential caregivers for each person over age 80 and most in need of care. By 2030, there will be four potential caregivers, and by 2050 only three potential caregivers for that same demographic. Technology can help to bridge that gap!
- * 46% of women age 75+ live alone
- * Those women who are age 65 today can expect to live on average to the age of 88.8, with 25% living to 90 or more.
- *Those men who are age 65 today can expect to live on average to the age of 86.6.


CORNING AREA AGING IN PLACE--ANNOUNCING ITS SOLUTIONS DIRECTORY

AGING IN PLACE UPDATES

Wayne--Our newly formed advisory group held its initial meeting in late May. The group is developing a draft survey that will be going out to area residents in July to learn about the needs of seniors residing in that very rural township.



Urbana--The Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry is giving out certificates for a free lunch at the Hammondsport Presbyterian's meal site which is open on Tuesdays. Area seniors are already beginning to redeem the coupons.

Pulteney--Cornell Cooperative Extension donated seeds and volunteers cleanedup the community garden raised beds. The Library and Grace Fellowship Church have each adopted a bed and a town resident has offered to adopt the third. Free vegetables and flowers will be available to area residents later in the summer!

Cameron, Jasper, Troupsburg and Woodhull-- The first senior luncheon was held in Woodhull at the Methodist Church with food provided by church volunteers, assisted by members of the Aging in Place advisory group there. The first issue of ELDERberry News was published by the Addison Post in April, and a second issue is underway.

EASY RIDER--a new transportation service that will assist older residents in all four aging in place projects is now underway. EASY RIDER will be providing transportation by van to area grocery stores for those who can no longer drive to the store themselves. The van will be driven by a member of the OFA staff who will also coordinate days and times of the service for each area of the county.
